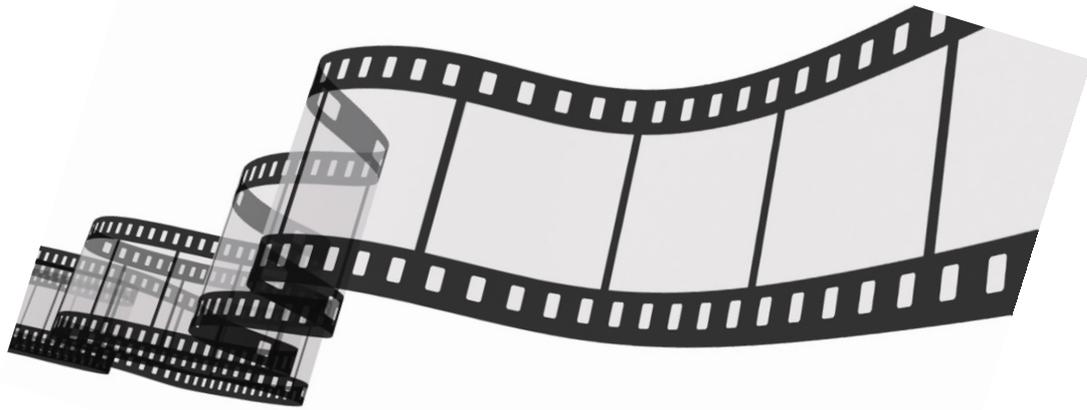


Italy through its films: Neorealism, Comedy and Fascism

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ITALY THROUGH ITS FILMS: PROGRAMME

Monday 8th October 2018

Event launch with overview of screening programme and an introduction to how to understand film as art and as a creative glimpse into the society it comes from.

Monday 15th October 2018

Rome Open City (Roma città aperta, Roberto Rossellini, 1945) - the foundation point of neorealism, the cinematic movement that brought Italian film to the world and showed the difficult realities of a country overcoming Fascism and war.

Monday 29th October 2018

Bicycle Thieves (Ladri di biciclette, Vittorio de Sica, 1948) - this simple tale of unemployment in post-war Rome is regularly cited as one of the greatest films ever made, and a vision of a kind of cinema rooted less in entertainment formulas than the poetry of human existence.

Monday 12th November 2018

Bitter Rice (Riso amaro, Giuseppe de Santis, 1949) - this realist gangster story represents an attempt to form a kind of radical leftwing entertainment, with boogie-woogie, romance, and the invention of the 'pin-up'.

Monday 26th November 2018

Persons Unknown (I soliti ignoti, Mario Monicelli, 1958) - a gang of hapless Roman would-be criminals plan a heist in this parody of the crime film *Rififi*.

Monday 10th December 2018

Divorce, Italian Style (Divorzio all'italiana, Pietro Germi, 1961) - a dissolute Sicilian aristocrat discovers that the easiest way to divorce his wife will be to kill her, in this satire of Mediterranean honour codes.

Monday 28th January 2019

The Seduction of Mimì (Mimì metallurgico ferito nell'onore, Lina Wertmüller, 1972) - a riotous feminist farce about the Mafia, political radicalism and gender relations in 1970s Italy.

Monday 11th February 2019

The Conformist (Il conformista, Bernardo Bertolucci, 1970) - a searing critique of the conformist mindset that upheld the Italian Fascist regime for twenty years, this is Bernardo Bertolucci's most accomplished achievement and an unforgettable vision of political cowardice.

Monday 25th February 2019

A Special Day (Una giornata particolare, Ettore Scola, 1978) - a film set entirely on one day, in one apartment block in Rome, this late pairing of the international megastar couple Sophia Loren and Marcello Mastroianni is an intimate, touching chamber piece about how state ideologies affect the everyday and the personal sphere.

Monday 11th March 2019

Life Is Beautiful (La vita è bella, Roberto Benigni, 1999) - Italian comedian Roberto Benigni's controversial decision to make a comedy about the Holocaust in Italy ended up as one of the most commercially successful and awarded Italian films of recent decades.

Monday 25th March 2019

Perfect Strangers (Perfetti sconosciuti, Paolo Genovese, 2016) - fascinating, funny and timely comedy-drama: this film is a digital-age reminder that we all are more than who we say we are, for better and worse.
